#### **Boxes**



I am asked these days if I'm looking forward to leaving. It's not a question I can answer honestly without risking hurting people's feelings but when I see the house now filling up with boxes it begins to reach the point when you know that home is no longer what once it was and you are on the move. The move is still ahead of me as I write and yet it has already begun. The attic is already cleared aside that is from empty packing boxes waiting to receive the electricals and other items that were kept safe within. I'm hoping that

with careful packing again, they will be ready to make their next journey. In case, reading this, you're unaware, I begin new ministry in Stoke on Trent on 25 March, Lady Day, the Feast of the Annunciation.

Deliveries and boxes are part of the modern world as white vans ply our streets with wares from online retailers. The box is unassuming and of no importance except that it holds within a treasured gift or possession. I'm reminded of the Amazon advert over Christmas that you may have seen as priest and imam exchange gifts purchased online (protectors to assist aching knees during prayer) and which arrive in simple brown boxes.

The English word 'box' derives from the Greek word 'pyx' and the Greek word retains an ecclesiastical meaning; the pyx is a small container, perhaps in silver, used to hold the holy sacrament as it is carried by the priest from the tabernacle, aumbry or altar and taken to sick at home or hospital. Again, the container is only of importance for what it holds, the bread of the Eucharist, the body of Christ.

The box tree is in Greek 'buxos' which suggest that boxes were originally made from boxwood. In Jamaica, it used to be the case that every home would have a 'box' out the back in the shed. Indeed, it was customary to make your own box, the box in question being, of course, the coffin. I never found this remotely morbid but a very down to earth spirituality that would accept there here, as folk tend to say, "we're all just passing through."

Life ends for us in the box; a sign surely of the reverence with which we continue to hold the human body. St Paul writes, "We have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us." (2 Corinthians 4.7) He might have said that we are ourselves the box to hold a transcendent treasure. Elsewhere he speaks of us being temples of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 3.16).

It seems that in the ancient world writing tablets were made of boxwood. A tablet was a 'puxion'. We're writing on each of our boxes in the hope of finding things again afterwards. And if we can't find it afterwards? If some things never turn up? Then I guess we can live without them. To be sure, there are no boxes (or sacraments for that matter) in heaven. They are signs here of being on the move, of for the time being us 'just passing through'. Once we arrive we don't need boxes any more.

#### LETTER FROM THE BISHOP OF WORCESTER



ndreas Whittam Smith is best known as the man who started the Independent newspaper. Equally significantly, as First Estates Commissioner, he has effectively 'run' the Church Commissioners for quite a few years — and done so brilliantly. He's stepping down soon and late last year he addressed the House of Bishops. I

was struck by what he said – that he feels more hopeful about the Church of England now than he has done for a long time.

That's quite something coming from a seasoned old hack like Andreas and I found it very encouraging. Why did he feel so hopeful? He felt the Church is at long last waking up to the fact that 'business as usual' is no longer an option and, more than that, is taking bold and innovative steps to reform and renew.

The scale of the challenge is enormous: The proportion of people in our country who have much understanding of the Christian faith, let alone practise it, is declining fast. What is needed is nothing less than the re-evangelisation of England. That's not an invitation to despair though, but a challenge to which, in the power of the living God, we can rise.

One exciting development in our diocese is the *Calling Young Disciples* project. Ruth Walker, its director, has already begun her ministry here and three Mission Enablers have already been appointed and will be taking up their posts soon. I hope and pray that their ministry will bear much fruit – not just to reverse the 'institutional decline' of the Church but bring people to a vibrant faith in the living God revealed in Jesus.

The renewal of the Church is not just up to them though; responsibility for it lies with us all. Please pray that we may all, as Kingdom People, fulfil our vocation to witness effectively to God's great love for everyone in Christ. May He make us instruments of his love, his compassion, his justice and His freedom.

I find it so encouraging that this joint mission venture has served our community well for six and a half years to date. #### Silence



Martin Scorsese's new film Silence is, let it be said at the outset, in the "hard to watch" category. Based on the novel by the Japanese

Roman Catholic writer, Shusaku Endo, the film narrates the fate of a Jesuit missionary to Japan in the 17th Century, one Fr. Sebastião Rodrigues. Reports have reached him that one of his fellow Jesuits has committed apostasy. As Rodrigues sets about witnessing to the gospel, he finds his faith challenged in ways he had never anticipated.

As the plot unravels, Rodrigues comes up against the brutal suppression of Christian faith by the Japanese authorities. The Jesuit mission has been successful in attracting local converts vet those same Japanese Christians have been subjected to appalling treatment. It's through their plight that Rodrigues is to learn the secret of his predecessor's apostasy. Although as a Jesuit he is well prospect aware of the martyrdom, the Japanese missionary context proves

unprecedented in its challenge. In Japan he encounters the silence of God - the title of the book and film.

It's not, in fact, the threat of his own death that proves to be his undoina. Rodrigues is made instead to witness the of his martvrdom Japanese converts. Their torture and death he can avert simply by placing his foot on an image of the crucified Christ that the authorities present to him. By renouncing his own faith, and only so, can he save those who are ready to offer their lives as martyrs to the faith.

It's an impossible dilemma that's only resolved when Rodrigues hears the crucified Christ speak to him: "You may trample. You may trample. I more than anyone know of the pain in your foot. You may trample. It was to be trampled on by men that I was born into this world. It was to share men's pain that I carried my cross."

Scorsese's film was premiered in the Vatican before Christmas and, of course, Pope Francis is himself the first Jesuit pontiff in history. In his first encyclical, EVANGELII GAUDIUM (Joy of the Gospel), Francis writes these words:

"A missionary heart ... makes itself "weak with the weak... everything for everyone" (1 Cor 9:22). It never closes itself off, never retreats into its own security, never opts for rigidity and defensiveness. It realizes that it has to grow in its own understanding of the Gospel, ... even if in the process, its shoes get soiled by the mud of the street."

They are words that chime with the experience of Rodrigues in the film and perhaps for all of us as we seek to witness faithfully to Christ, to do so with compassion, without defensiveness. Perhaps it's only by such means that we can truly let God be God and find joy in the gospel.

**HOW CAN LIFE GO ON?** Is a title not thought out by me, and will have

separate and poignant meanings to individuals.

By the time you read this, the day will have happened, and many of us will have joined hundreds of others of all creeds, religions, atheists and all ages, joining together to remember the dreadful events of the Holocaust.

A few days before typing this article, I watched Antiques Road Show on BBC 1. A programme I enjoy, and often wondered why I didn't have a priceless work of art or jewellery or artefact screaming 'I'm worth a fortune'. But this showing on the 15th January was different.

It brought tears to my eyes – and hopefully, if you saw it, to yours also.

All the items shown were memorabilia from the horrors of the death and concentration camps created by the evil Nazi regime as a means of extermination for any group of human beings they considered to be impure. Pieces of yellow cloth with the Star of David; the pyjama like striped suits so many of us have seen in the grainy flickering of films shot at Liberation, hanging on the skin and bones of the poor souls who somehow managed to live just a little while longer.

Memories by survivors, retelling of how they survived the horrors, and the stories of those who risked their own lives to help them. Photographs of family they never knew and or would never see again.

The dreadful thing is that some 60 odd years later the rise of extremism is happening again in Europe and in the USA. Not yet with any power, but in some areas having great influence on weak governments. In our Lord's time this same evil existed, perhaps under different guises, but was there.

The Jews were a favourite and very often easy target for the Nazis, who wanted to achieve their total extermination. The gas chambers did not recognise the Jews or the socialists or gipsy or homosexual.

In different forms this has gone on many times throughout the ages – and still does today! The name today is ethnic cleansing (remember Kosovo? The Kurds in Iraq?)

Throughout all this, not every person in Nazi Germany was a murderer or Nazi following the party line.

Many like you or me helped shelter, feed the starving and the refugee from the Ghettos. Anne Frank? Your next door neighbour?

Frank Foley, born in Somerset, was the passport officer in Berlin, although in reality he was the head of the secret service there. His undercover activities directly saved the lives of over 10,000 Jews, but in reality, many more. When Frank retired in 1948 he moved to Stourbridge where he and his wife lived unassuming lives until he died in 1958. If you visit Jerusalem see his name at Yad Vashem as a "Righteous Among the Nations".

In 2016 the theme for Holocaust was 'Don't stand by'.

In 2017 the theme for Holocaust is 'How Can Life Go On?'

Life does go on, but we should not forget or be allowed to forget the events of the Holocaust.

See you in 2018, unless the hand on the trigger presses the wrong button. JH.
